Refund Policy

A full refund will be granted if a student withdraws from first-semester classes by 5 p.m. on Friday, June 3. Withdrawals for the second semester must occur prior to 5 p.m. on Friday, June 24. Full refunds will be provided for classes that do not meet a minimum enrollment one week prior to the scheduled start.

No refunds will be issued for the following reasons:

- If a student registers for class and does not attend
- If a student withdraws after the abovementioned withdrawal dates for any reason
- If a student is dropped for violation of the Student Code of Conduct—Appropriate Use of Computer/Internet and/or the High School Attendance Policy.

Textbooks

Textbooks for the summer High School program are available for purchase or rent from the Follett College of DuPage Bookstore. Parents/guardians must be present for in-store textbook rental and a credit card is required. You will find information on required books and materials, and their corresponding ISBN numbers when applicable, at www.cod.edu/youth.

The College of DuPage Bookstore is located on campus in Glen Ellyn at 425 Fawell Blvd. in the Student Resource Center (SRC), Room 1060. Absences

Summer school is a condensed school experience; however, illness and emergencies do occur. In accordance with state mandate, students are allowed two (2) absences per semester course. More than two absences per course will result in a "Withdraw" grade being issued for no credit, without a refund. Calling in a student absence does not excuse the absence.

Tardies

Four (4) tardies at the beginning of the day, the break, or leaving early at the end of the day per semester course equals one (1) absence. Tardies exceeding 15 minutes equal an absence.

Any combination of absences and tardies that exceed two (2) days results in a "Withdraw" grade being issued for no credit, without refund. Every effort is made to notify the parent/guardian of absences or tardies. Parents are asked not to register their child for summer school classes when they anticipate a conflict with their personal schedule. No special arrangements will be made after the allowed two (2) days of absence for any reason.

Final Exams

Final exams are given on the last day of class for each semester. If a student is absent for the final exam, COD cannot and will not provide an opportunity for any "make-up exam," nor will COD administer the final exam early or proctor the exam at a later time. The grade the student receives for the final exam in these cases is recorded as an "F" (zero points) and is factored into the semester grade.

Absences, tardies and final exam policies are outlined in the Student/Parent Handbook. The parent/guardian and student signatures on the Student/Parent Handbook constitute understanding and acceptance of these conditions.

Accelerated Format

Consult with your high school guidance counselor prior to registration. Parents and students should be aware of the accelerated pace of the COD High School summer program. One day in the summer program equals one week of a regular school year. The fast-paced nature of the program includes:

- Extended lecture times
- Compounded homework and reading assignments each evening
- Frequent quizzes and testing



HIGH SCHOOL CREDIT COURSES

College of DuPage offers a two-semester High School Credit summer program. These programs are open to students entering or currently enrolled in high school. The summer program is an extension of the regular academic program designed to provide students with opportunities to gain academic credit or to explore interests by auditing a class. It is an excellent occasion for incoming freshmen to become more familiar with high school expectations.

Prompt and consistent attendance is mandatory to ensure the same contact hours, teaching and learning opportunities as during the school year. One day in the summer program equals one week of a regular school year. Students should not register for classes for high school credit if they have vacation plans, athletic camps/competitions or other obligations that prevent them from attending class. Textbooks for these courses are available for purchase or rent through the Follett College of DuPage Bookstore. A complete list of textbooks and ISBN numbers can be found at www.cod.edu/youth.

The first semester runs from June 7 to June 28; the second semester runs from June 30 to July 22. Classes are offered in two formats. All College of DuPage locations for high school courses are scheduled for four hours per day, Monday to Friday. District 204 high school courses are scheduled four days a week, from 7:30 a.m. to 12:50 p.m., Monday to Thursday.

High School Credit Course Descriptions

Homework is assigned and grades are given.
Check with your guidance counselor for credit eligibility.

Mathematics

Algebra I, Sem. I and II

This course is equivalent to high school Algebra I and promotes the sequential study of variables and variable expressions encompassing operations of real numbers, systems of equations and inequalities, graphs of linear relations, rules of exponents, work with quadratic functions and equations, operations with polynomials, including factoring techniques, operations with rational expressions, and radical expressions and equations. The course is designed to strengthen students' skills and attitudes toward quantitative reasoning.

Algebra II with Trigonometry, Sem. I and II

This course is the equivalent of high school Algebra II with Trigonometry and reviews and extends the main concepts of algebra by examining linear equations and inequalities, systems of linear equations, quadratic functions and complex numbers, polynomial functions, rational exponents, exponential and logarithmic functions, arithmetic and geometric sequences and series, combinations, permutations and probability, right triangle trigonometry, graphing trigonometric functions and solving trigonometric equations. Prerequisite: Algebra I

Geometry, Sem. I and II

This course is equivalent to one year of high school geometry and promotes the sequential study of coordinate geometry, measurement, inductive and deductive reasoning, parallel line relationships, congruent triangles, quadrilaterals, proportions related to similarity, right triangle relationships, circles and their related angles and segments, area formula for planar figures, surface area and volume formulas for solids, and equations and graphs of lines. The course is designed to strengthen students' skills and attitudes toward quantitative reasoning. Prerequisite: Algebra I

Pre-Calculus, Sem. I and II

This course is equivalent to one year of high school pre-calculus and reviews and extends the main concepts of advanced algebra by examining functions, equations and inequalities that include linear, quadratic, polynomial, exponential, logarithmic, rational, and radical, as well as sequences and series. The course is designed to strengthen students' skills and attitudes toward quantitative reasoning. Prerequisites: Geometry and Algebra II

Language Arts

American Literature, Sem. I and II

Two semesters of American Literature are equivalent to one year of high school American Literature and emphasize the study of American literature, literary history, language and composition. Please note that this is considered a junior-level course in most local school districts but is offered to sophomores in District 204.

British Literature

This course explores literary trends of the late 19th- and 20th-century British writers. Poetry, essays, novels, short stories and plays of this period are included. Classic works are read, discussed and analyzed within the context of the eras they represent.

English 9, Sem. I and II

Two semesters of English 9 are equivalent to one year of high school freshman English and cover fundamental skills in composition, grammar and usage. Emphasis is given to reading, writing, thesis-development and continuity, literary types, vocabulary and study skills.

English 10, Sem. I and II

Two semesters of English 10 are equivalent to one year of high school sophomore English and emphasize the study of literature, writing, grammar, vocabulary, study

skills and complex tasks and expands on the skills introduced at the freshman level.

English I — Literature, Language and Composition

This course targets literacy analysis through study of myth, short story, novel, poetry and drama. Descriptive, expository, argumentative and narrative writing, as well as basic research techniques and speaking skills are emphasized. In addition, students refine grammar and usage skills through the writing process and effective composition strategies.

English II — American Literature and Composition

This course includes the study of American literature from colonial through contemporary periods using thematic strands. Students read journals, biographies, essays, novels, short stories, plays, and poetry representing American authors and authors of various ethnic backgrounds. The literature promotes the student's analytical abilities and encourages critical thinking through the writing of expository, argumentative, and narrative essays. In addition, the literature serves as models and materials for speaking in persuasive, informative and entertaining forums.

English III — Comparative Studies and Composition

This course continues college preparation of language and composition through a skills-based study of a wide variety of texts representing multiple cultures and genres. Students utilize skills to critically analyze information, synthesize valid sources, and develop cogent arguments while implementing 21st century skills and technologies.

Film as Literature

Students study film as a form of literature from historical, thematic, genre and artist approaches to viewing films. Students also study and put into practice the styles and techniques of making motion pictures. While there is an emphasis on viewing, listening and group discussions, students develop notable English-based skills. Reading skills are addressed through assignments. Writing skills are addressed through a strong expository writing component in the curriculum.

Speech

This equivalent of one semester of high school Speech is designed to help students develop an understanding of basic concepts in the process of oral communications, including communication theory, speech preparation and delivery.

World Language

Spanish I, Sem. I and II

This course is the equivalent of one year of high school Spanish I. It serves as an introduction to the sound system, pronunciation, basic vocabulary, verb structure and other grammatical concepts of the language.

Spanish II, Sem. I and II

This course is the equivalent of one year of high school Spanish II. It builds and expands on the concepts





covered in Spanish I while introducing more advanced structures and vocabulary. Listening comprehension, speaking, reading and writing skills are practiced through small group and teacher-directed activities.

Spanish III, Sem. I and II

This course is the equivalent of one year of high school Spanish III. It integrates the concepts covered in Spanish I and II with more complex structures and advanced vocabulary. Increased fluency and enhanced communication skills are achieved through the reading of short stories and through writing exercises. Homework is assigned and grades are given. Check with your guidance counselor for credit eligibility.

Sciences

Biology, Sem. I and II

This course is the equivalent of one year of high school Biology. A basic survey of the biological sciences, this course employs an inquiry approach to study living organisms and their basic structures. Topics include chemistry, cells, ethics, classification, plants, ecology, study of animal body systems culminating in a dissection, evidences of evolution, structure and function of DNA, protein synthesis, Mendelian and applied genetics, and current trends in biology.

Chemistry, Sem. I and II

This course is the equivalent of one year of high school Chemistry, covering fundamental lab skills through the periodic table and kinetic molecular theory through an understanding of acid-base reactions. It focuses

on understanding the different forms of matter that comprise our physical world and the many changes these forms of matter undergo in our universe. District 204 students have a geometry prerequisite.

Physics, Sem. I and II

This course is equivalent to one year of high school Physics. This course is designed to give the student an overview of various areas of the physical universe. Laboratory experiences permit inquiry into the nature of physical science and to inquire into the nature of physical law, a process that is transferable to any discipline. Some problem solving is included. District 204 students have a geometry prerequisite.

Social Studies

American Government

This equivalent of one semester of high school American Government provides students with a critical perspective on government and politics in American life. Attention is given to the political system, how it works and the rights and responsibilities of citizens. The U.S. and Illinois Constitution tests are administered during this course.

Comparative Religions

An introduction to the world's major religious traditions: Hinduism, Buddhism, Judaism, Christianity and Islam. Students analyze and compare each religion's foundations, historical development, beliefs and cultural impact. Its primary purpose is to equip students with an understanding of the practices and major ideas of the

world's religions so that they may better understand the world in which they live.

U.S. History, Sem. I and II

This course is equivalent to one year of high school U.S. History. Attention is given to Colonial America, the American Revolution, the rise of American political thought, Federalist and Republic eras, westward expansion, manifest destiny, slavery, Civil War, Reconstruction, Progressive movement, economics, Post War, Cold War, Civil Rights, Vietnam, Watergate and recent administrations. The U.S. and Illinois Constitution exams are given during the first semester of the class.

Business and Consumer Education

Consumer Education

This equivalent of one semester of high school Consumer Education promotes the study of financial principles and consumer practices on which individual and family welfare depend. Topics include career planning, budgeting, taxes, insurance, housing, investments, buying techniques, product evaluation and consumer resources.

Economics

This course is the equivalent to one semester of high school economics. It is a study of the American economic system and its role in the global economy. Topics include money, taxes, investment, supply and demand, labor issues, international trade and global economic systems.


