Enjoy the sunshine

Sunshine makes us feel good, but its rays can be damaging. Make sure your family members avoid direct sunshine during the hottest time of day and wear protective hats, clothing and eyewear. To be effective, sunblock should be applied hourly even on cloudy days.

Never permit swimming in an unguarded area and become knowledgeable about the water conditions where you plan to swim. Make sure your children learn to swim and always swim with a buddy. Some kids can't wait to get back to school, others are anxious; whatever your student's state of mind, it makes sense to pay attention to this important transition time.

- If your family's routines go haywire in the summer, start re-establishing them as school approaches. Most kids are happier and do better in school when their routines for bedtime, waketime, napping and meals are regular.
- Walk your child to school or to the bus stop several times before school begins to establish the best route and help make your child comfortable.
- Conduct an inventory. Is your student's backpack still serviceable? What about shoes, outerwear and supplies? (see www.d41.org for supply lists). Label your student's belongings to avoid loss and confusion.
- Shopping for school together is a good way to open discussions about school: things to look forward to, concerns, expectations and friendships.
- Designate a place in the house for doing homework and for putting away backpacks and other school-related items. Scrambling in the morning for lost items is a sure way to add stress to the day.
- If your student packs a lunch, work together to plan healthy, satisfying lunches. Your student is more likely to eat a good lunch if he or she had a hand in planning it.
- If possible, plan to be there when your students gets home from school on the first day.
- Attend school welcoming activities with your student—meeting the teacher and seeing the classroom are great ways to reduce anxiety.
- Get involved in school...it's fun and your involvement helps your child feel safe and secure in school. PTA is a great place to start.

ABSENCE

Parents should call the school as soon as possible after 8 a.m. each morning any day when their child will be absent or tardy. Vacations during the school year are discouraged.

BICYCLES

Students must obey the bicycle rules and regulations for each school area as well as all traffic rules or lose the privilege of bringing a bicycle to school. Students should wear helmets. The school is not responsible for lost or damaged bicycles or helmets. Scooters, rollerblades and skateboards are not permitted on school property.

CELLPHONES

Cellphones are permitted on school grounds but may not be used during school hours except in an emergency. The principal is responsible for determining if a situation is an emergency.

CONFERENCES

Parents of all students in grades K-8 are scheduled for a parent-teacher conference at least once annually. The conference is mandatory for parents of students in grades 1 - 5. When necessary, other school faculty members are involved. Conferences are held at the end of the first quarter.

CURRICULUM

Learning in grades K - 5 focuses on reading, language arts, mathematics, science, social studies, health and safety, physical education, the fine arts, outdoor education and consumer education. Junior high level courses (grades 6 - 8) include all of the above, plus French, Spanish, art technology, music, health, family and consumer science and industrial technology. Instrumental music is available to students in grades 4 - 8 for orchestra, and grades 5 - 8 for band.

DISCIPLINE

Good discipline maintains an orderly school climate and an atmosphere which is safe and conducive to learning. A Parent-Teacher Advisory Committee reviews existing discipline policies and advises the Board of Education regarding additions or revisions which may be required. Discipline policies and procedures printed in this district handbook for parents and students are distributed within 15 days of the opening of each school year or upon enrollment in the district. Discipline policies adopted by the Board of Education and procedures developed by district administration are applied with reasonable uniformity throughout the district.

Minor infractions: Minor infractions are handled at the classroom or building level by the teacher, the principal and parents.

Gross disobedience or misconduct: Gross disobedience or misconduct will be dealt with severely and may include a recommendation to the Board of Education for suspension or expulsion of the student. Law enforcement authorities will be notified when appropriate. Examples of gross disobedience include possession, sale, transfer or use of tobacco, alcohol, intoxicants, drugs or other controlled substances; assault, theft, vandalism or trespassing; giving a false fire alarm; threat of bodily harm or participating in gangs and cults.

Hazardous objects: A hazardous object is anything that could be identified as hazardous to the safety of the student, staff or facility. Hazardous objects are prohibited and any student bringing such objects to campus which are not related to a special report will be subject to disciplinary action. Any student who brings a weapon to, or is in possession of a weapon at school, or any school-sponsored or related activity may be referred to the superintendent for expulsion and reported to local law enforcement authorities. Staff members have been instructed to report any student who threatens bodily harm to a staff member, another student or any member of the school community to the student's principal and parents. Law enforcement authorities will be notified when appropriate.

Removal of Students from Classroom: A teacher may temporarily remove a student from class for disruptive behavior after first using less severe disciplinary measures. Students have the opportunity to present information pertinent to the reasons for removal, and parents may request a review of the teacher's action.

Physical Contact / Corporal Punishment: Corporal punishment is not used.

Physical Restraint: Teachers may use reasonable force to maintain safety for other students, personnel or property and to prevent significant disruption of the school program. Educational support personnel are generally prohibited from using physical restraint or contact except to prevent serious and imminent injury; and then only if a certified employee is not available to restrain the student.

Suspension: The superintendent, principal, or assistant principal are authorized to suspend students for 10 school days for gross disobedience or misconduct in accord with district procedures and applicable law. Behaviors of a serious nature may result in a principal assigning a student to in-school suspension.

DISCIPLINE RECORDS

DISCRIMINATION

The school district does not discriminate against students on the basis of race, religion, national origin, gender, disability or sexual orientation.

EMERGENCY CLOSINGS

If the District 41 schools must be closed due to an emergency, parents will be notified over local radio stations. When school is in session and it is necessary to dismiss early due to extreme weather conditions or other emergencies, the schools will attempt to notify parents by telephone, our voice mail, and www.d41.org. You may also sign up for an automatic email notification at www.emergencyclosings.com.

EMERGENCIES

(see Safety)

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

All students may participate in the instrumental music program which begins at fourth grade for strings / orchestra and at fifth grade for band. There is a \$30 fee for instrumental music and chorus and a maximum fee of \$45 for students enrolled in both. Students must provide their own instruments. Instruments are available for rent. At the K-5 schools, extracurricular activities include student council, a variety of clubs, safety patrols and a chorus for students in grades 4-5. Hadley Junior High fields interscholastic teams in a variety of sports. Participating Hadley students pay a fee of \$30 per year, with a maximum annual fee of \$50 for those involved in three or more sports (Hadley fees for orchestra and band count toward the maximum). An intramural program is available to all students in grades 6-8. Hadley also offers activities such as student council, bell choirs, chorus, a variety of clubs, and the school yearbook.

Fees

A yearly materials fee is due for all students at registration. Fees vary by grade depending on required supplies and activities.

Free milk, free meals and reduced-price meals are available for eligible students under the National School Lunch and special Milk Programs. Applications are available from all principals. No student will be denied admission or be unable to participate in activities because of the inability to pay any fee. Fee waiver forms are available from all principals.

FIELD TRIPS

Classes may take educational field trips during the year. Such trips will be made in school district-approved carriers with teachers in charge. Notification slips will be sent home with students to be signed by a parent or guardian and returned to school. There may be a charge for transportation fees and costs of admission.

FREEDOM OF INFORMATION

In compliance with the Illinois Freedom of Information Act of 1984, requests are accommodated for the examination and copying of public records of the school district. Please call the Superintendent's office.

GIFTED SERVICES

The gifted service specialists work with classroom teachers to meet the needs of identified students through a variety of service options, including small group special instruction outside the regular classroom, whole class presentations or lessons, co-teaching with the classroom teacher, and consultation to the regular teacher. The services are designed to extend and supplement the instruction in the regular classroom for students with identified gifted needs.

HEALTH SERVICES AND REGULATIONS

Communicable Diseases: Parents are requested to report all contagious diseases to the school and to keep the school informed of any changes in the student's general health or physical status. A medical excuse certificate is required if a child is unable to participate in physical activity, physical education class and recess for more than one week.

Health Screenings: Vision screening of students in grades K, 2, and 3 is conducted annually. New students, special education students, and those known to have vision or hearing problems are screened annually. Following any of the screening procedures, parents will be notified if referral to a physician is indicated.

Illness at School: School nurses are assigned to all schools and are available for emergencies. If a student complains of not feeling well, he or she will be sent home as soon as proper arrangements are made. An emergency card is completed for each student who enrolls in the district. This information should be kept up to date.

Immunizations: Physical examinations and immunizations are required of students entering kindergarten and fifth grade or new students from out of state. Completed immunization series are required for diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, polio, rubella (German measles), regular measles and mumps. In Kindergarten, chicken pox vaccine is required. At fifth grade, the Hepatitis B series is required. Physical exams are acceptable if completed up to one year prior to the start of Kindergarten or fifth grade. Children transferring into District 41 must meet Illinois state requirements for immunization and have had a physical examination within a year prior to their transfer. Records will be requested from the previous school.

Medication: Only those medications necessary to maintain a student in school and which must be given during school hours or school activities may be administered to a student. Students are permitted to carry prescribed rescue inhalers while in school if a liability waiver and a signed medication form is on file in the nurse's office. All medications given to students must be prescribed by a licensed prescriber on an individual basis as determined by the student's health status. All medications, whether prescription or over-the-counter, need a medication form signed by a physician each school year.

HOMEWORK

Homework is assigned as an extension of the school's instructional program, in pursuit of instructional goals, and not as a punishment.

HOURS

Please plan your child's departure time so that arrival at school will be no earlier than 10 minutes before the start of school.

INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS

Instructional materials may be inspected by parents. Call the principal's office for an appointment to view any of these items.

INSURANCE

D41 has purchased accident insurance for children attending D41 schools providing coverage for injuries incurred while participating in any school-sponsored or supervised activity. Expanded coverage is available for a fee. Insurance brochures are available at registration and in each school office.

INTERNET USE AND ACCESS

Board policy indicates that access to the Internet is reserved for curriculum-related purposes only. Parents must sign a form acknowledging that they are aware of this policy prior to students using the Internet.

KINDERGARTEN

Children who are five years old by September 1 may enroll in kindergarten. A government-issued birth certificate must be presented at the time of registration.

LUNCH

Any child may remain at school during the lunch periods. (check specific schools for length of lunch periods). Children who stay at school for lunch are governed by the rules of conduct established by the school. Those who do not obey the rules may be suspended from staying at school for lunch.

MANDATED REPORTING

Staff members are required to report to the principal and appropriate authorities any accusations of child abuse or neglect or sexual harassment.

PARENT ORGANIZATIONS

The Parent-Teacher Association (PTA) is an active organization at each school in District 41. Units are coordinated through the Glen Ellyn PTA Council and are affiliated with the Illinois and National Congress of Parents and Teachers. PTA school yearbooks, newsletters and bulletins are distributed throughout each year to inform parents about PTA events and activities.

PERSONAL PROPERTY

Personal property brought to school which creates a hazard or causes general disruptions is prohibited. The school is not responsible for students' personal property when brought to school for any reason. Pets may be brought to school only with the permission of the principal.

PETS

Pets are not permitted on school property when children are present unless the principal has granted permission.

PHOTOS

Students' pictures are taken annually by a professional photographer. At the time photos are taken, information is sent home to the parents regarding purchase options. There is no obligation to purchase the photos.

RECORDS

Student records are confidential and they shall not be released other than as provided by law. Student records include grade transcripts, accident and health reports, attendance records, honors/awards received and participation in school activities. Parents have access to educational records maintained by the school system and are invited to examine their children's records before the conclusion of eighth grade. If you would like to see your child's records, please provide the school office a few days notice.

Permanent Records: Permanent records include names, date and place of birth, gender, grades, class rank, attendance, accident reports and health records, honors and awards, participation in school activities and a record of any release of information. Permanent records are maintained by the district for a period of 60 years.

Temporary Records: Temporary records include family background, test scores, psychological, intelligence and personality tests, achievement tests, participation in extracurricular activities, honors and awards, teacher comments, discipline records, special education files, and records of any release of information. Temporary records are maintained at the school the student last attended in the district for a period of five years. The building principal maintains records of teacher discipline referrals and student penalties. Referrals are maintained separately from student permanent and temporary records. Discipline referral records are maintained and managed with the same policies and procedures as other student records.

REGISTRATION

Students entering the district for the first time must provide a certified copy of their birth certificate. In accordance with state law, the school district is required to notify local law enforcement if the certificate is not provided. Proof of residency such as driver's license or lease agreement is also required.

REPORT CARDS

Written progress reports are sent home following the end of the second, third and fourth quarters.

RETENTION

Students will be promoted to the next higher grade level based solely on academic performance. Students who do not qualify for promotion to the next grade level will be provided remediation and may be retained.

RELEASE OF INFORMATION

Information such as a student's name, address, telephone number, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance and awards received is periodically made public by District 41. This information may be given only to PTA members for publication in school directories or to the local press in district-issued news releases. Parents have the right to request that part or all of this information remain confidential. Parents may also request that their child not be photographed or videotaped for use within the district or by the media. This request should be made by the parent in writing to the principal at the start of the school year.

SAFETY PROCEDURES

Crisis: In an emergency when there is danger to students or staff, principals will notify the Glen Ellyn Police or Fire department. Once emergency personnel are on site, they will secure the building and take charge of the incident.

Crisis response teams: Each building has a crisis plan and a crisis team is available.

Information: The police / fire department representative or the superintendent will serve as the official spokesperson in a crisis. Building telephone trees will be used to inform parents of school closings and emergency services. Updated information will be made available to the public as often as needed on an hourly basis, if necessary. Updated information will be provided

by individual school telephone trees, school voice mail, district voice mail, 630-790-6400 and www.d41.org.

Disaster drills: Fire, tornado and other safety drills are conducted regularly. Each school office has a Ten-Ten one-way radio which monitors state police weather reports. During a tornado watch, the principal posts a spotter to maintain a continuous watch of the sky. Information is disseminated to all staff members; however, classes continue without interruption. Students will be kept at school during a tornado warning until the all-clear signal. If the warning comes at dismissal time, students will not be dismissed and school buses will not depart until an all clear is given.

Playground: Every effort is made to prevent injury to children on the playground and while students are going to and from school. Children are supervised when playing during lunch hour, during physical education classes and during recess.

Building Security: All exterior doors except the main entrance of each school are kept locked during the school day. All visitors, including parents and volunteers, are required to check in at the school office upon arrival. Staff and visitors must wear identification badges while in the schools.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT

The school district does not tolerate any sexual harassment among adults or students. Any harassment, including verbal or physical conduct that is intimidating, hostile or offensive, should be reported to a school official. A grievance procedure will be followed up to and including the principal, superintendent, Board of Education, Regional Office of Education and the State Board of Education.

SIP DAYS

On SIP Days (School Improvement Plan), building staff members work on developing, implementing, and integrating activities to maximize human, material, and fiscal resources. There are eight SIP Days per year held on Fridays with early dismissal for students at lunch time.

SMOKE-FREE POLICY

All District 41 buildings and grounds are smoke-free, as required by state law. Smoking or use of tobacco products is not allowed on school grounds, including outdoor athletic events.

SOCIAL EVENTS

Social events and class parties require the principal's approval. Three or four class parties may be scheduled during the school year. The PTA cooperates with classroom teachers, and students may be asked to bring a small fee at the beginning of the school year to cover the cost of refreshments. Birthday treats may be distributed under the direction of the teacher.

SPECIAL SERVICES

Special Education: District 41 offers a full continuum of services for students with special education needs. Most students requiring special education services receive assistance in their home schools. Students requiring placement in self-contained programs are served through our membership in the Cooperative Association for Special Education (CASE). When special education services are considered, a team including but not limited to the student's classroom teacher, parents, school psychologist, social worker, nurse, special education teacher and building administrator are part of the decision making process.

Preschool: Preschool age students can participate in free screenings conducted several times a year. These screenings identify those students requiring additional evaluation in speech and language, vision and hearing, motor development, social skills and cognitive abilities.

Remediation: The District 41 remediation program focuses on early intervention. Teaching assistants, all of whom are certified teachers, work under the direction of classroom teachers to

provide both short-term and long-range additional help to students. Eligible schools also offer federally-supported Chapter 1 remediation programs.

Speech / Language: Speech and language screening is conducted for students referred by parent or teacher. Eligible students will receive speech and/or language therapy to assist them within the school setting.

SUMMER SCHOOL

Summer school brochures are distributed each spring to the families of all currently enrolled students.

TELEPHONE

Telephone calls to the school requesting that messages from parents be delivered to students should be restricted to emergency situations. Students use of school telephones is also restricted to emergency situations.

TESTING

To get necessary feedback on student learning, District 41 administers a variety of standardized assessments at various grade levels. In addition to these tests, annual assessments mandated by the Illinois State Board of Education are administered in specific subject areas to all students in specified grade levels. Parents will be notified when these tests occur and when results are available.

TRANSPORTATION

Students are eligible for bus transportation if they live more than one and a half miles from school or if they would otherwise walk along a route that has been determined to be hazardous. If space is available on an existing route, some students who live

within the mile and a half bus boundary may be eligible to ride the bus for a fee. Bus schedules are available on registration day. If a student encounters a problem aboard a bus, the school should be notified immediately. Students who create safety problems will have their bus privileges suspended or revoked.

VISITING SCHOOL

Visiting classrooms is encouraged. Please contact the classroom teacher a day or two in advance to arrange a visit.

VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers are a vital part of D41, as library learning center aides, classroom aides, health aides, reading tutors, art appreciation aides, extracurricular program coaches/sponsors and community resources.

Like most school district boundaries, the D41 boundary does not match up with any particular community; as the map at right shows, it covers parts of five towns: Carol Stream, Glendale Heights, Glen Ellyn, Lombard and Wheaton.
