Points of Pride for the 2022/2023 School Year

The District 41 **Preschool for All program** achieved the **Gold Circle of Quality** awarded by ExceleRate Illinois. The D41 Preschool program is currently based at Forest Glen.

The District 41 Board of Education is one of 33 Illinois school boards to have earned the **School Governance Recognition Honors** for 2022 by the Illinois Association of School Boards (IASB).

District 41 schools are designated in the top two categories of **"exemplary" or "commendable"** by the State of Illinois "Illinois Report Card." Four of our five schools are designated as exemplary.

Hadley Junior High Principal **Steve Diveley** was honored as the **Middle School Principal of the Year** for the State of Illinois.

Congressman Sean Casten's office, as part of his Community Project Funding Grant for the 6th District, awarded District 41 with **\$250,000 to fund more mental health support** for our students.

District 41 is in the process of becoming the **first Heart Safe School District in Illinois**. To become a Project ADAM Heart Safe School district, District 41 is implementing a quality sudden cardiac arrest program of awareness, training and effective emergency response.

Hadley Junior High has been recognized as a **National School to Watch** by the National Forum to Accelerate Middle School Reform and an Illinois Horizon School by the Association of Illinois Middle Grade Schools.

Benjamin Franklin Elementary School Digital Literacy Specialist **Katie Johnson** was named the Glen Ellyn Chamber of Commerce **District 41 Educator of the Year**.

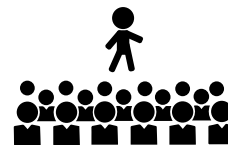

FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

The new Illinois State Superintendent, Dr. Tony Sanders, sent a letter earlier this spring explaining the “proficiency rates” for Illinois school districts.

I thought it would be helpful for the community to understand how the State of Illinois determines how school districts are doing. I am extremely proud that District 41 is in the top 10 percent in the 6th highest ranking state with the toughest standards. Here is how Dr. Sanders explains the State of Illinois standards and proficiency:

“Illinois educators have a lot to be proud of. According to U.S. News & World Report, our state ranks #6 in the nation for pre-k-12 education. Six Illinois districts are among the top 20 public school districts in the nation, including claiming the top two spots. Last year, the National Assessment of Educational Progress (aka “The Nation’s Report Card”) showed that our students scored above the national average in both reading and math for Grades 4 and 8, while many other states saw declines. And we rank #11 for youth mental health.

Illinois has the most rigorous standards in the nation. Each state measures “proficiency” differently. It’s like comparing home runs across ballparks with vastly different outfields or comparing someone’s mile time on a flat track versus mountain terrain.

Being “proficient” in Illinois requires much more than reading on grade level. Our standards include a depth and breadth of higher order language arts skills, including writing, logic, critical thinking, and analysis. Out of five levels, only the top two count as “proficient” in Illinois. These high standards guide us to ensure our students are truly ready for rigorous content at the next grade level.”

Thank you for your partnership to make District 41 a great place for students to learn and grow. It takes everyone in the community to help each and every student thrive at school, home and in the community.

Full-Day Kindergarten UPDATE

With another school year ending, I wanted to provide an update on the steps the D41 School Board has taken to further explore opportunities for providing full-day kindergarten (FDK) for all children. After the fall referendum failed, the Board met to discuss and reconfirm its commitment to the community to continue looking for a viable way to provide FDK to every student. D41 is one of only four school districts in DuPage County that offers only a half-day kindergarten program.

In February, the Board authorized its architect of record to conduct a feasibility study on using District reserve funds to build a FDK program. Our current elementary schools lack the space to accommodate a universal FDK program. Two options were approved. The first was to build a FDK Center on the Churchill Elementary campus that would provide modern instructional space for all kindergarten students. The Board successfully purchased property behind Churchill with

the purpose of expanding its early learning instruction. Option two was to build a 5th grade wing onto Hadley Junior High School. Under this scenario, all district 5th grade students would attend classes on the Hadley campus, thereby opening space in each elementary school for FDK. Additionally, the Board requested a district-wide facilities study to examine whether it was possible to pursue other capital projects with reserve funds to address additional classroom space needs.

Depending on the studies' findings and District recommendation, the Board will consider the most appropriate step forward. My Board colleagues and I recognize the community's strong and enduring support for FDK for all. We unanimously share that belief in FDK and have dedicated our efforts to fulfill the community's aspiration.

Hadley Principal Named Illinois Middle School Principal of the Year



Representatives from Horace Mann and the Illinois Principals Association were at Hadley Junior High on March 23, 2023 to announce that Hadley Principal Steve Diveley has been named the 2023 Illinois Middle School Principal of the Year! All 8th grade students, the Hadley Jazz Band, student Board members, Mr. Diveley's family, and a number of other honored guests gathered for an assembly to surprise Mr. Diveley with the news. In addition, the assembly was live streamed so that all classes could watch the announcement.

Steve Diveley has served as principal at Hadley Jr. High School for the last 10 years. He previously served as principal at Heritage Grove Middle School in Plainfield for seven years and an assistant principal for five years prior. Mr. Diveley has been a member of the Illinois Principals Association since becoming a principal in 2005.

Mr. Diveley shared, "To be a successful instructional leader, my energies and actions should center around knowing my community and seeing or learning where I can lead the organization to meet the demands of my community. This includes cultivating trust with staff and stakeholders to adapt in ways that promote learning and high expectations for the community. I believe that the middle school model of common plan time for staff, smaller communities of students in teams, a focus on SEL for early adolescents, and a robust exploratory, co-curricular, and extra-curricular program is needed to develop our young people. This is not done alone, for to implement change requires the trust of the people around you. When they have a voice in the decision, trust the path and methods, and are part of the celebration, improvement in the educational program and student achievement will follow."

Hadley Receives National Schools to Watch Redesignation

Hadley Junior High was recently honored with the National Schools to Watch Redesignation. To earn this, the Hadley School to Watch team had to show how it has effective systems through 1) Systems and Structures 2) Social Equity 3) Academic Excellence and 4) Developmental Responsiveness. As a part of the accomplishments resulting in the redesignation, it is notable that Hadley implements a model where all teachers co-teach for at least one period every day. They also implement an advisory period each morning to help students start their day checking in with a trusted adult.

At a Board meeting in April, Executive Director for the Association of Illinois Middle Schools, Mr. John Viano presented the Hadley team with a plaque in recognition of this designation.

NEW PRINCIPAL AT CHURCHILL

District 41 is pleased to announce that the Board of Education approved the appointment of **Amanda Kanter** as the next Churchill Elementary School Principal. The appointment is effective July 1, 2023.

Mrs. Amanda Kanter currently serves as Assistant Principal at Winston Churchill Elementary School in Schaumburg School District 54. Prior to being promoted to assistant principal in her district, she taught for over six years as a classroom teacher at the elementary level and served as a tier two building PBIS coach and reading interventionist. Mrs. Kanter earned a bachelor's degree in elementary education and a master's degree in organizational leadership both from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign. Mrs. Kanter is a Golden Apple Scholar who has prior experience in a Title 1 school.

"I am greatly looking forward to joining the Churchill community as school principal. It is clear District 41 is home to many compassionate and caring individuals who inspire excellence for our students," said Mrs. Kanter. "As school principal, I commit to fostering a high level of collaboration and trust so that, together, we can ensure our students reach their utmost potential."

Superintendent Dr. Melissa Kaczowski expressed how excited we are to have Mrs. Kanter join the district as the next leader of Churchill School. "We had a tremendous response to our posting and held a very rigorous interview process. Amanda impressed the various interview groups and emerged as the candidate of choice for the position," said Dr. Kaczowski. "We look forward to bringing on a new administrative team member and leader in our district. Amanda brings numerous strengths as she comes to us from a district that does exceptional work with PLCs and culture/climate."

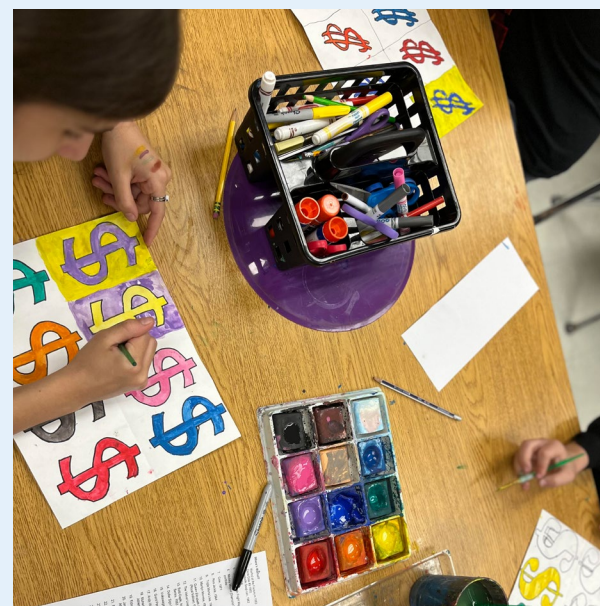
